

Mustersocken Knitalong



Sock-Knitters-Mobile

Mustersocken-Knitalong

Materials:

left-overs of 4-plyed sockyarn in different colours
a small piece of coloured paper
glue
2 small wooden beads
1 matchbox
6 tooth picks
1 paper-strip, 1 cm wide, 10 cm long
nylon threads to fix the finished pieces
1 mobile cross or mobile ring
Needles: 2,5mm double pointed needles

Mini-Socks

Cast on 24 stitches. Divide evenly across 3 or 4 needles and join for knitting in the round. Be careful not to twist stitches.

Knit 5 rounds for the ribbing: *k1, p1, repeat from * till end of row

Knit 15 rounds in stockinette stitch or add pattern if you like to.

Knit your favourite heel.

Knit 15 rounds for sole and foot and start knitting your favourite toe.

Knit two socks and sew them carefully together.



Knit another sock, but cut off yarn after some rows of foot. Slip the stitches on tooth-picks using them as double pointed needles.

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Footie-socks

Cast on 24 stitches. Divide evenly across 3 or 4 needles and join for knitting in the round. Be careful not to twist stitches.

Knit 10 rounds in stockinette stitch.

Knit your favourite heel.

Knit 15 rounds for sole and foot and start knitting your favourite toe.

Knit two socks and sew them carefully together.



Mini-Knitting-Book

Separate the two matchbox pieces.

Cut off one small side of the cover.

Wrap the coloured paper around the cover and safe it with a drop of glue. Write up what you like to mark it as a knitting book. Glue box and cover together.



Mini-Yarn-Ball

Wind a small ball with approximately 4cm diameter of left-over sockyarn. Push one wooden bead on one end of a tooth-pick and safe it with a drop of glue. Do the same with another tooth-pick, using both as knitting needles. Push the tooth-pick-needles through your yarn ball. Secure your thread while pushing the needle through the ball.



Mini-yarn-ball

Wind another ball of yarn using a pencil as a nostepinne. Wrap your yarn several times around your pencil, than start wrapping your yarn in a 45 degree angle to the pencil shaft. With each wrap turn the pencil slightly forward. For the next pass of wraps, lay them right up against the previous round. They shouldn't be right on top, but they should be quite close. You'll gain practise as you go forward. Continue in this manner until your ball is big enough for you. Wrap the small piece of paper around your ball, write up any information about your yarn that you want to remember.



Finishing

Fix your finished pieces with a nylon thread on the mobile cross. Be careful to find the balance.

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
